

James Barron: This is an important part of your work: showing women who are comfortable with their bodies. It's not a common enough perspective in our world.


Vera Girivi: I went to the beach the day before I painted this. The sea was a bit rough, and a wave flipped me over and dragged me down. For a moment, I thought my life was coming to an end. I felt a weight on me, and I didn't understand anything anymore. My legs were in the air. I saw my whole life flashing in front of me.

When I managed to get out of the water, my bathing suit had been pulled all over. My friend was saying, "Cover yourself!" but I thought, Who cares? My concern was not the bathing suit, but getting out of the water alive.




Vera Girivi: They say the hand is the hardest thing to paint, and I like to look at perfect hands, but I prefer to paint this kind of hand. I like big and very twisted hands—not perfect, small, well-groomed hands.

James Barron: Henri Matisse also painted such big, twisted hands. The eyes are big too. Why?

Vera Girivi: When I was little, my mom suffered from a thyroid disease. She was beautiful, but because of her thyroid, her eyes were wide open, popping out. I was scared of these eyes as a child; then she had surgery and they were fine. When I see people with eyes like that, it reminds me of my mom.
